SHOTGUN FOUR BALL-BETTER BALL STABLEFORD RULES: -

The Competition will be played in accordance with the Rules of Golf as laid down by the R & A.

The handicap allowance will be $\frac{3}{4}$ of each competitor's playing handicap, subject to a playing handicap limit of 28 for men and 36 for ladies.

Play will commence at **11:30 am** on your "allocated start hole". The Competition Committee will allot starting positions (hole number on the course) and will advise the first named competitor on the entry form. Players will need to be registered in the clubhouse and then go out on the course to their start hole in good time i.e. **10 minutes before start of play.**

All disputes will be referred to and settled by the Competition Committee, whose decision will be final.

Competitors must produce a current handicap certificate, signed by their Club Secretary, on the day of the Competition.

Competition entries will be allocated on a first come first served basis.

SHOTGUN

A shotgun start is a **golf** tournament format in which all groups of players tee off simultaneously from different holes. Each hole on a course will be the tee off hole for a four ball. Group 1 would start from hole 1, Group 2 from hole 2, etc. Each group starts play at the same time.

FOUR BALL-BETTER BALL STABLEFORD

This competition is to be played by two players competing as partners (i.e. team of two). Each player plays his own ball. Two teams play together in a "4 ball". Only one player can score for each team on a hole, so the points calculated on the hole are based on the best results from the two partners in the team. Where the partners score the same points on a hole, the result is marked down for the player who "holes" out first. If a player cannot beat the points score of their partner, they usually pick up to help the speed of the game.

In each 4 ball" one player from each pair will mark the card for the other pair. During the round, each player and marker has to calculate the points allocated to each score on a hole based on the stroke index. Gross score must be marked on the card, net score and points should also be marked.

For example, a player on 12 handicap receives 9 shots ($\frac{3}{4}$) on holes marked index 1—9, i.e. the 9 hardest holes. A player on 36 handicap receives 27 shots, 2 shots on holes marked index 1—9 and 1 shot on holes marked 10—18.

The points scoring system:

Points are allocated to the "net" score. For example if a player scores 5 on a par 4 and has 1 shot, then his net score is $5-1=4$ "net par". If a player scores 8 on a par 5 and has 2 shots, then his net score is $8-2=6$ "net bogey".

Double bogey:	or more: Players who exceed their calculated par by two strokes receive	0 points.
Bogey:	A score of one stroke over your calculated 'par' this will result in	1 point.
Par:	If you make your calculated 'par' you will score	2 points.
Birdie:	A score of one stroke better than your calculated par will result in	3 points.
Eagle:	A score two strokes better than your calculated par will result	4 points.
Albatross:	A score three strokes better than your calculated par will result in	5 points.

Only one marker and one player from each team need sign the card. At the end of the round, the Stableford points are totalled to give the resulting score. The highest point score wins the competition. In the event of a tie, then the result will be decided by countback by the competition committee

If on any hole, a player has already played too many strokes to score points, then he is expected to pick his ball up to maintain pace of play.
